Objective:	<p>The student will be able to explain how myths are traditional stories that were used by the Greeks to explain things they did not understand.</p> <p>The student will be able to understand many of the facets of everyday life by understanding their gods. Examples include their fear of violent weather (Zeus), the sea (Poseidon), and the fact that they were often involved in war (Apollo).</p>
